Conditions continue to stay dry as we head into the holiday season. *The Governor has issued a state-wide burn ban* which does not allow any type of open-air burning. Anyone caught burning could face a fine and jail time. We were recently paged out to a vehicle fire on Highway 180 near Navy Cove where the vehicle fire ignited the grass and the fire spread from Highway 180 to Ponce de Leon Court.

Your Fire Department responded to 28 emergency calls in October:

· 11 medical calls · 6 false alarms

· 3 brush fires · 1 vehicle fire

· 1 public assist

· 3 water rescues · 3 vehicle accidents

With the burn ban in effect, even the Fire Department must delay the practice burns that we had scheduled. We will continue to practice operation of our new pumper and plan to hold a class on our air ambulance service. Baldwin County now has access to air ambulance service with Medstar's new helicopter, Air Care-1. We are planning for Air Care-1 and its crew to join us at one of our training meetings within the next couple of months.

Fort Morgan peninsula had a banner year for sea turtle nests with a total of 96—double the average of past seasons. Although a number of hatchlings were lost to the high storm surge, we still had great success in getting babies to the water.

Fort Morgan Planning & Zoning Advisory Committee

The committee met November 19th to consider a request for rezoning of five lots on the south side of Highway 180 between Triple Tail and Gulf Wind Court. The owner was requesting a change from B2 (Neighborhood Business District) to RTF4 (Duplex Family Dwelling 4 units/acre). The committee sent a recommendation for approval to Baldwin County Commission, since the change would be compatible with surrounding properties and the committee saw no reason to deny.

Judging from the pictures it is apparently juveniles/teens.

REMINDERS: lights, alarms and video cameras are an invaluable tool. Thanks to some of the homeowners with cameras, we have been able to obtain some great evidence and information on problem areas. This time of year there is typically an increase in burglaries due to fewer people being at rental/vacation homes. Be vigilant in reporting suspicious behavior as well as checking your property regularly.

Fort Morgan History & Folklore

The following story is reprinted with permission of Harriet Outlaw. She commented that, like many of her works, this is a folklore story based on tales people have told her. Her stories have their roots in oral tradition.

Local Folklore: The Lady in Blue of Fort Morgan by Harriet Outlaw

Fact and Fable collide sometimes. That is when the best folklore comes to life. Such is the case of the Lady in Blue I saw one night under the full moon at Fort Morgan.

We were participating in a living history weekend at Fort Morgan, camping inside the fort, eating food cooked over the open fire, and conducting educational tours and reenactments for the public. Before turning in for the night, we shared stories of eerie events that many people have experienced – such as seeing a man hanging in the barracks, a man in uniform marching across the parade ground, and the sounds of gunshots and sobbing. Many people say that Fort Morgan is the most haunted fort in the south. Not surprisingly, sleep did not come easily and I got up to sit out under the stars and soak up the atmosphere. My eyes scanned the eerie outline of the walls of the fort against a sky lit by the full blue moon. A blue moon occurs when there are two full moons in one calendar month, and I was fortunate enough to be there on that magical night.

There she was – the Lady in Blue walking the north wall ramparts. I had heard of her, but did not fully believe until I saw her. Her face was a shadow, but the long flowing dress was luminescent and translucent, just like the blue moon. There was no doubt in my mind that this was the lady of lore, the tale told for almost 100 years.

I first heard about her a long time ago, when Mike Bailey, now Director of Fort Morgan, told me that several people claim to have seen the lady, although he had never had that privilege. As we chatted about the possible explanations for her supernatural presence, he related to me the story of a gentleman named Louis Pepin who came to visit the fort in his latter years. He wanted to see once again the place where he was born. He was born while his dad was stationed there when the fort was training young men for World War I. His father was then sent to Hawaii for duty, and returned to Fort Morgan as commanding officer when Louis was about eight years old. Louis and his brother loved living in the officer's quarters, attending the school right there on the grounds of the fort, and most of all, playing in the sugar white sand of the beach on the Gulf of Mexico, searching for treasures that washed up every day. But one discovery they made on the beach was heartbreaking, because it was the body of a lovely young lady, dressed in a long blue gown. Louis' father, for a reason unknown to his sons, had her body buried in the northwest corner of the fort, perhaps in the long lost cemetery of the fort. Louis remembered that among those at the graveside was one officer's wife, who was inconsolable. After the burial, it was not long before people began to see a lady walking along the ramparts on the highest walls of the fort.



Who was she and how did she get there? The mystery of the lady lies in the hold of another legend of Fort Morgan. The ruins of the beautiful Rachel, a three-masted schooner, are visible after the sands about five miles east of the fort are washed away from time to time by storms that hit the gulf beaches. The wreckage is sometimes called "The Mystery Ship," and many want to claim it dates back to the War Between the States, but Mike knows the truth behind the waterlogged remains of the ship. When it last arose from its sandy grave after Hurricane Ike in 2008, several media reports, including a national network, featured the mysterious ship. The fact is that the wreckage is actually the remains of one of the largest ships ever built in the DeAngelo Shipyard at Moss Point,

Mississippi. The Italian Shipyard on the east bank of the Escatawpa River was built by John De Angelo, who came from a family of shipbuilders in Italy. The Rachel was completed in the early 1920s, but met her fate in her first year, when she ran aground just off the shore of the peninsula in October. Her cargo of lumber and most of her outfitting hardware were saved, but she was later mysteriously burned. The reports say that no lives were lost. But is that a fact? The crew of eight survived, but were they the only ones on the Rachel?

Now, this is the point in the story where fact and fable merge to make the moving tale of the Lady in Blue. Lorna lived in Moss Point, married to a cruel and heartless husband. She wrote to her twin sister, Lois, who was the wife of an officer at Fort Morgan and told her that she would have to escape her tormentor before he took her life.

From her home, Lorna watched as a large new ship was being built at the shipyard across the river. An escape plan began to grow. She wrote to Lois that she would come to her sister aboard the new schooner Rachel, plotting a way to stow away in the hold of the ship. When Lois heard of the wreckage of the Rachel, her heart feared for her sister, but was bound to silence for fear of her sister's husband. She sensed that Lorna had been hiding in the hold of the ship, and stayed there even after the cargo was removed, somehow undetected. Lois walked the beach daily searching for her, praying she had made her way to shore and safety. However, when the ship was in flames, she had that feeling that close sisters can have. She knew her sister had been aboard when the ship was torched. Her body washed to the beach many days later and no one else made a connection with the Rachel. Until now as I read a journal hidden away for 100 years in my

mother's trunk. It tells of fear of the sister's husband and the secret of her quiet burial under a blue moon in October. I hope that one day I can see the wreckage and feel the hope that was hidden there in the hold. But at least, I know that I have seen the visage of that hope. In a blue dress on the ramparts of Fort Morgan.
