Fort Morgan Planning & Zoning Committee.....Ernie Church, Vice President

The Fort Morgan Planning and Zoning Advisory Committee met at 9 am, December 19th to consider Case Z-190001. Applicant wants to rezone a portion of their property from RSF-1 to B-4 to permit commercial use such as a seafood restaurant/hospitality business. The committee recommended denial of the request and recommended resubmission to rezone to B-3. With B-3 the applicant still can develop a small local business compatible with area zoning.

The Baldwin County Commission met on December 18th, 2018. Commissioners agreed with our Fort Morgan Advisory Committee and overruled the County Planning and Zoning Commission on two cases. Those applicants will have to revise and resubmit for reconsideration.

Fort Morgan History Alabama Gulf Coast 1933-1939 by Chan West

We will continue to explore the history of the CCC, WPA, and paving of the Fort Morgan Road ["Dixie Graves Parkway"] through newspaper articles which Heather Tassin, Fort Morgan director, and Jeanette Bornhold, Foley Library, have so graciously provided.

From 1933 until 1939, the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) occupied what is now Gulf State Park. The CCC program was designed to build national and state parks all over the US and gave many young men jobs to help them and their families to make it through the depression. They made \$1.00 a day, 5 days a week. At the end of the month, when they were paid, \$25 was sent to their families. A CCC camp was constructed and consisted of a barracks, a sawmill, resident houses for the management to live in, and a maid's quarters. Until the permanent structures were complete, the CCC boys lived in large tents. They built the park, roads facilities, trails, telephone lines, firebreaks.

Did you know that there is a small CCC museum at the state park? You probably have driven by it many times. It is in the small old brick building on the south side of the road as you enter the park. Park on the grass. No one is stationed there and you will have to turn on the lights. A useful bit of information: there is a rest room inside.

For more information about the work of the CCC here and in the rest of Alabama, I recommend a book available through our county libraries, *The Civilian Conservation Corps in Alabama, 1933-1942,* by Robert Pasquill, Jr. He interviewed many former members of the corps, including a resident of Gulf Shores, whom some of you may have known, Damon Fuqua, 1915 – 2012. In his later years Damon and his partner Dwight Steele installed and maintained wells and pumps for south Baldwin County, especially our Fort Morgan area, before the city water lines were extended.

Next month we will publish his interview. His history is typical of many of the CCC boys, but not of all. From Mr. Pasquill's book: A January 5, 1935 Inspection Report:

Of 159 men from New York, New Jersey, and Alabama

- 63 dishonorably discharged for refusal to work
- 1 for theft
- 1 for eloping

Morale was "a little below average' with a food riot in Aug. 1934

Our Fort Morgan Road was constructed by the WPA and the CCC. For these two agencies to work on the road it had to be state or federal land; therefore, local property owners deeded parcels to the state to create a strip 330' in width, the minimum width for a parkway. That is why our Fort Morgan Road today has a right-of-way which is 165' from the centerline. In 1937 at the formal opening, it was christened Dixie Graves Parkway in honor of the wife of the Governor Bibb Graves and today still has that name on many maps. At that time there was no idea of using that right-of-way for utilities but the benefit today is that there is no need to acquire private property for such.

Fort Morgan History ~ Indian Canal......Harry King

Dr. Waselkov and I gave a presentation to the South East Archaeology Conference in Augusta, Georgia, attended by 800 skeptic Archaeologists. The presentation went very well and we had the only Prehistoric Canal subject on record. The Indian Canal and associated mounds will be visited by many archaeology students and professors in years to come.

We plan to excavate again in late January on Little Lagoon, across from Peninsula Golf Course,15300 Fort Morgan Road (just west of Laguna Court) on Sundays from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm. Bring a round bladed shovel and lunch or snacks.

The milkweeds have lived up to their reputation as host plant for the Monarchs. On December 12th Monarch caterpillars were spotted on the milkweed leaves. The bright yellow-gold flowers are still thriving, too. This is the only known host plant for the Monarchs. The threat to Monarchs is partly due to the toxic spray used to kill weeds on our roadsides and highways. Some sources quote a 90% decline in the past half-century. Milkweeds are perennials, self-propagating, and will spread fast.

The Monarchs arrived October 28th, spending hours every day feeding on the milkweed blooms. The heaviest visitation continued until November 28thand slowed only after the two-night light freeze. Adults have not appeared in the past ten days. **PLANT MILKWEED!**
